Summary: Staff is seeking a Park and Recreation Advisory Board recommendation for the Stephen Siller Tunnel to Towers 5K Walk/Run special event proposed to be held at Breezewald Park on Sunday, June 11, 2023 from 9am-12pm. The approximate number of attendees for the event is approximately 600 to utilize the park grounds and Lake Zurich Police proposed route leaving from and returning to the park (requiring no fully street closures nor use of State/County roads).
 - B. Parks Program Capital Improvement Project
Summary: Staff is seeking a Park and Recreation Advisory Board recommendation to shift the \$46,000 budgeted capital dollars associated with resurfacing the basketball court amenity at Bristol Trails Park to renovating the flooring at Buffalo Creek building B. The facility flooring will require ADA accessible ramps which allows the department to also utilize the SRA funds to support the project. The court is currently in good condition and the department is proposing to use the capital dollars to further support the dance program with a more suitable and permanent floor. Currently building B has modular grid lock floor tiles along with multiple rolls of shower pan liner that cover the existing linoleum floor. The Academy of Performing Arts dance program generates \$222,500 and is the department's largest program revenue source serving 822 participants last year.

1. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 4:05pm by Chair Koch.

- 2. Roll Call:** Chairperson Kevin Koch; Members: Tim Andrews, Shawn Bergfalk, Cathy Malloy, Allen Borg, Jeff Carey. Staff present: Recreation Director Bonnie Caputo, Recreation Supervisor Jenna Stanonik and Elke Kadzielawski. Trustee Greg Weider was present. Sariah Quimby was absent and excused.

3. Approval of Minutes: December 13th, 2022

MOTION made by Tim Andrews, seconded by Cathy Malloy to approve the minutes of the December 13th, 2022 Park Advisory Board meetings as presented. Roll call vote, all yes. MOTION CARRIED

4. Public Comments:

Mary Kozub- Ancient Oaks President

Mary passed out a synopsis of yearly accomplishments the organization has achieved. Mary shared that although Judi has stepped down as President, she is still Mary's guiding light. Mary feels that the attitude towards Ancient Oaks by the community is that they just weed- but they do so much more than that. Mary feels that the organization is in a maturing process and there are more and more like-minded people that are coming together to grow the organization. The fundraisers that they put on are getting bigger and bigger which is tremendous. Ancient Oaks has hired a part-time Executive Director. They have paid \$7,800 towards much needed burns in town to assist the Village with this process. Ancient Oaks is in the process of choosing their major projects for 2023/2024. The organization recently lost a member suddenly and the family decided in lieu of flowers that donations be made to Ancient Oaks in her honor. Ancient Oaks is wanting to complete 5 projects they feel would honor her spirit. They are hoping to partner with the Sarah Adams PTO as well as District 95 to accomplish some of these projects. The projects range from small to larger. March 2nd is the projected start date for projects as that was her birthday. Mary wanted to point out that Ancient Oaks is part of the Chicago Wilderness as well as the Lake Michigan Restoration Initiative. They have a regional support with great educational values.

5. New Business

A. My Density Matters

Summary: Director Caputo read the Summary into the record that My Density Matters is looking to run a 5K walk on Sunday, October 15th, 2023. The Director of Development, Laura came and spoke on the organization's behalf. The organization was founded by a Hawthorn Woods resident after her cancer diagnosis was undetected for 10 years. The organization is hoping to do a 5K walk in Paulus Park to raise money.

The mission of My Density Matters is helping to educate women how to find this early. Laura brought a powerful visual showing the different categories of density. Chairperson Kevin Koch made the motion to approve. Cathy Malloy said yes and Vice-Chair Andrews was the second. Roll call vote, all yes. MOTION CARRIED

B. Internal Special Events

Director Caputo read through the list of Internal Special Events and the dates that they will potentially run. Chairperson Koch asked about the logistics of Food Truck socials for Wednesdays. Director Caputo shared that Shawn Bergfalk will be coming to the Paulus Park grounds to look over the location and help determine where the artisans will go. Chairperson Koch asked what is taking place at Block A that the Food Truck Socials cannot take place at that location. Director Caputo stated that there is infrastructure work taking place this Summer. Allen Borg asked the ages of the Tween Event. Director Caputo stated we hold to the ages 9-12yrs. old. Chairperson Koch asked if the 4th of July is the same as last year. Director Caputo stated that yes it is the same format and structure as prior years. Jeff Carey asked if the 4th of July would be on the actual 4th of July and if the fireworks still launch from the water. Director Caputo stated yes to both questions. Vice-Chair Andrews asked if it was the same vendor for the fireworks as years prior. Director Caputo shared that yes it is the same vendor. Chairperson Koch asked how Brazilian fest did. Director Caputo stated that event would be discussed in the next line item of business. Chairperson Kevin Koch made the motion to approve. Allen Borg said yes and Vice-Chair Andrews was the second. Roll call vote, all yes. MOTION CARRIED

C. External Special Events

Director Caputo read through the list of External Special Events and the dates that they will potentially run. Director Caputo highlighted that Brazilian Fest has dropped down to one day instead of day like last Summer. The organizers felt it was difficult on the vendors to commit to two days. Phase Three Brewing Company has requested to move their event to the weekend earlier than prior years. Jack-O-Lantern World is requesting slightly altered times than years prior. They are expanding their offerings during the event and want to potentially operate a haunted trail. They are going to be strategic with their scares on the trails so it is not too close to homes. Vice-Chair Andrews asked about the noise ordinance in relation to the Jack-O-Lantern World request and Director Caputo stated that the approval of the events and the offerings supersedes the noise ordinance. Cathy Malloy questioned if there would be extra security with the expansion of offerings. Director Caputo shared that Jack-O-Lantern World hires their own security. Shawn Bergfalk asked if this is an isolated request or will this bleed into other requests. Director Caputo shared it is an isolated request. Director Caputo shared that there are occasional music complaints in regards to park programs/events but volume and music is very personal so the complaints vary. Chairperson Koch asked if people will jump out on the haunted trail. Director Caputo shared that yes, that is the intention. Jeff Carey stated that this only helps continue to bring people in to Lake Zurich. Director Caputo thanked Jeff Carey for his comments and shared this is why Jack-O-Lantern World is switching things up to keep things innovative and people coming back to get a new experience even if they

have attended prior. Cathy Malloy asked if Jack-O-Lantern World was seeking additional space in the park for their new offerings. Director Caputo said no they are not. Chairperson Koch asked which organization the fundraiser portion of the Bushel of Apples fest goes towards. Director Caputo shared it is some sort of organization that supports those with special needs. Allen Borg asked if eight porta potties would be enough for the Bushel of Apples event. Director Caputo shared that the bathrooms in Paulus Park are still open and still accessible so it should be plenty. Chairperson Kevin Koch made the motion to approve. Jeff Carey said yes and Allen Borg was the second. Roll call vote, all yes. MOTION CARRIED

D. Jonquil Playground Renovation

Director Caputo read the summary for the playground renovation plan. The ten different playground proposal boards were presented to the Park Advisory Board. Director Caputo asked the members to vote for their top three choices. This was not a voting item, it was for discussion only.

6. Old Business

A. None

7. Treasurer's Report

Director Caputo shared that things are looking very favorable right now due to the Academy of Performing Arts dance program as well as Cricket Theater. Director Caputo also shared that this is not yet reflected, but the day camp program is almost completely full at this time. Chairperson Koch asked if we had a waitlist last year for day camp. Director Caputo shared that we did, but we at least made it to the first week of non-resident registration. Jeff Carey asked since it is a well-liked community program are we able to expand temporary capacity? Director Caputo shared that she would like to remind everyone that we did go to referendum for expansion and it was a resounding no from the community. Shawn Bergfalk suggested that we communicate that we cannot expand no matter the need as there is some mistruths that if the need is there we are able to expand. Cathy Malloy asked if we can run satellite camps. Director Caputo stated that while that sounds easy enough you run into staffing challenges as well having to hire additional bodies on top of what is already needed. Jeff Carey stated that it does not hurt to have some cause and effect communication. Cathy Malloy and Tim Andrews do not like the idea of raising prices to lower the waitlist for future programs.

8. Advisory Board Member Reports/Update

A. Cathy Malloy/Tim Andrews- Miracle on Main Street

B. Shawn Bergfalk-Groove Grove.

Shawn reminded the group that this event is moving to Paulus Park for the Summer. There are already two bands secured, Gritland Band and Downer's Groove. Shawn is hoping to connect with the local High School to see if there are any bands interested in playing the last open Groove Grove.

- C. **Kevin Koch-Farmers Market.** Chairperson Koch shared there is not a lot of new information in regards to the Farmer's Market. There is a meeting next week on the books.
- D. **Jeff Carey- Rock the Block-** Director Caputo gave an update as Jeff was unable to attend the last Rock the Block Committee meeting. The band selections have been made. With this being the 10th year, the committee felt it would be cool to do a throwback to the 1st and 2nd year of the event. The opening band will be Kelly Daniel's Band {formerly Rockstar Rodeo} the middle band will be Hello Weekend and the final band closing out the evening will be ARRA. Jeff Carey asked if there will be a DJ in between bands. Director Caputo shared that is in talks with the Mayor. Cathy Malloy asked if the event is going to be longer. Director Caputo shared that it will be 4:00-11:30pm this year. Jeff Carey shared that he wanted to discuss making sure people put their first and last name down when signing up to volunteer. If there are now four shifts for volunteers is it possible to make sure the shifts are not changing when the bands are also changing as it gets difficult. Director Caputo shared that the Park and Recreation Department tried their best to do so. Director Caputo reminded the Park Advisory Board that all event opportunities are posted so go to lakezurich.org and committees please look at your events and shift times. The Department felt three hours was a lot to commit to Rock the Block when the typical shift was always two hours in prior years.

9. **Director's Report**

- A. **Event Updates-** Director Caputo pointed out that there was an error in the Spring/Summer Park and Recreation Department Brochure and that the annual Egg Hunt is actually free.
- B. **Park Highlights/Updates-** Director Caputo stated that the OSLAD punch list is being completed. There is a new grant project opening. The sprayground is quite aged and the pit with all of the mechanics is in a confined space. This would be another matching grant- \$400,000 to \$400,000. There would also be more shoreline restoration, potential wayfinding signage, additional work on trails etc... This would come with community input meetings, board meetings etc... The Park and Recreation Department would go with Hitchcock design again as there is an established positive working relationship with that organization. Meetings have begun in regards to the bandshell design. The electronic marquee is also being discussed.
- C. **Facility Highlights/Updates –** The Chalet deck/flooring project is almost complete. Public Works did the deck internally and it looks amazing. The bid for the roof for Buffalo Creek A and B is currently out for bid right now. The Park and Recreation Department is looking at potentially having the dance floor in Buffalo Creek Building B redone instead of tennis courts, which is roughly \$49,000. This would just be a shift in funds within the budget from one project to another more in immediate need.
- D. **Program Update-** Recreation Supervisor Elke Kadzielawski shared new independent contractors that have been brought on board to bring new programs to our community:

- Lifesport in Lincolnshire, pickleball and adult tennis
- Exact Sports- volleyball/lacrosse
- Top Strength and Performance
- DOGU-Dog obedience classes

Supervisor Kadzielawski also shared that the Park & Recreation Department will be offering dry storage and rentals. Each rack holds up to 10 non-motorized crafts. The Department has their own racks for internal rentals. Chairperson Koch asked if the non-motorized get LPOA stickers. Director Caputo shared that residents purchase stickers through the Park and Recreation Department and it is \$50 per craft. Vice-Chair Andrews shared that he has so many neighbors who run and then kayak and will be very pleased with this offering.

- E. Staff Update- Director Caputo shared that there are interviews this week for the Special Events Supervisor and the department is still looking for a part time afternoon person from 12:00-4:00pm. Shawn Bergfalk asked if those hours can be flexible at all. Director Caputo shared that they cannot as we need someone until the building is closed.

- 10. Written Communications- see the flyers attached. Supervisor Kadzielawski gave an updated on the APA competition results. There was 1 Idol Star awarded, 12 Platinum, 13 Golds and 1 Silver.

- 11. Adjournment

MOTION made by Allen Borg, seconded by Vice-Chair Andrews to adjourn the meeting. Voice vote, all in favor. MOTION CARRIED. The meeting was adjourned at 5:25pm.

Subject: Parks Program Capital Improvement Project

Issue:

The Fiscal Year 2023 budget includes \$46,000 in the Capital Fund 401 for the basketball court resurfacing at Bristol Trails Park. As the basketball court is currently in good condition, the department is requesting to delay the resurfacing and shift the budgeted capital dollars to renovate the flooring at Buffalo Creek Building B, a project currently residing in our Capital Improvement Plan. The facility flooring will require ADA accessible ramps which allows the department to also utilize the SRACLC fund to support the project.

Analysis:

The Village of Lake Zurich's Academy of Performing Arts (APA) dance program has continued to grow since its inception in 2013. The program began with under 50 participants and ended 2022 with 822 participants. The program is anticipated to generate \$222,500 in FY23 which makes it the department's largest program revenue source annually.

APA currently operates from the department's Buffalo Creek facilities. Dance utilizes the wooden sprung floor studio in Building A and, due to increased enrollment, expanded to Building B in 2019. To accommodate the expansion as the conversion of space was mid fiscal year, staff were able to cover the existing linoleum floor with modular grid lock floor tiles along with multiple rolls of shower pan liner to provide a more suitable surface for certain genres of dance.

As the APA program continues to grow and dancers age throughout the program, there is a greater demand to offer a wider variety of classes that cannot always be accommodated in the studio with the wooden sprung floor such as ballet and pointe. The renovation of the facility flooring has been captured in the Capital Improvement Plan since 2019 and had a projected completion dated of 2020, however, was delayed partially due to COVID-19, virtual programming and other competing Village needs. The department believes that this investment will continue to support the continued growth of the program in years to come.

Recommendation:

Staff is seeking a Park and Recreation Advisory Board recommendation to shift the \$46,000 budgeted capital dollars associated with resurfacing the Bristol Trails Park basketball court amenity to renovating the flooring at Buffalo Creek building B.

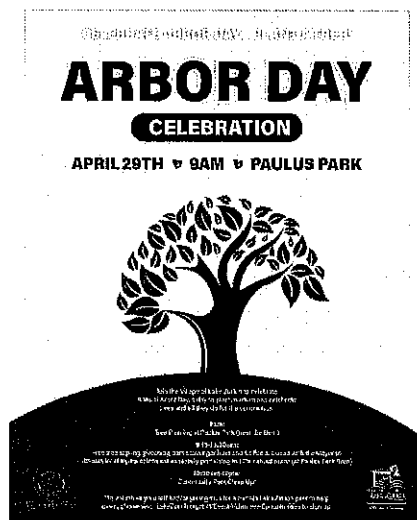

Departmental Narrative

The Spring and Summer brochure hit households the week of February 6th and resulted in an unprecedented response from residents in regards to resident registration for our day camp program which saw the majority of programs full within the first 72 hours. As of February 28th, the Park and Recreation's summer day camp program for grades entering 1st through 4th, Camp Alpine, including our post camp has filled to capacity. Camp Cedar, grades entering 5th – 7th) currently have post camp availability only. There are still openings for Kamp Kiddie (ages 3-5) which is currently 85% full and weekly variety camps. The current waitlist is comprised of 75 unique participants. The department is accommodating wait-listed participants as openings arise. All waitlist participants have received communication (as of 2/16) thanking them for their interest in our program and notifying them that this season we experienced an unprecedented response in the program registration with the majority of camps filling within the first week of registration. We candidly informed them that due to maximum facility capacity numbers, the department is not be able to accommodate any additional program participants into our camps this season but that they would be contacted if we experienced any program cancelations leading up to the start of the program. Please note registration for non-residents was set to begin on Monday, March 13th. At this point, we anticipate little to no availability for Lake Zurich non-residents into the program.

The department is continuing to hire for aquatics and camp seasonal positions. The staff team recently attended the Stevenson Career Expo and will be attending student expos at Lake Zurich, Mundelein and Wauconda in the upcoming months to help spread the word on our Summer opportunities at the Village. Hiring is slow and retention is lower when compared to previous years. IE. We have lost over 10 staff from last season to Lifetime Fitness aquatics positions due to the rate of pay (\$18 per hour for lifeguard/swim instructor). Positions are posted on the Village's website and any interested individuals are encouraged to apply at <https://lakezurich.org/jobs.aspx> Also posted online are the Guest Service Associate and Recreation Supervisor-Special Events opportunities.

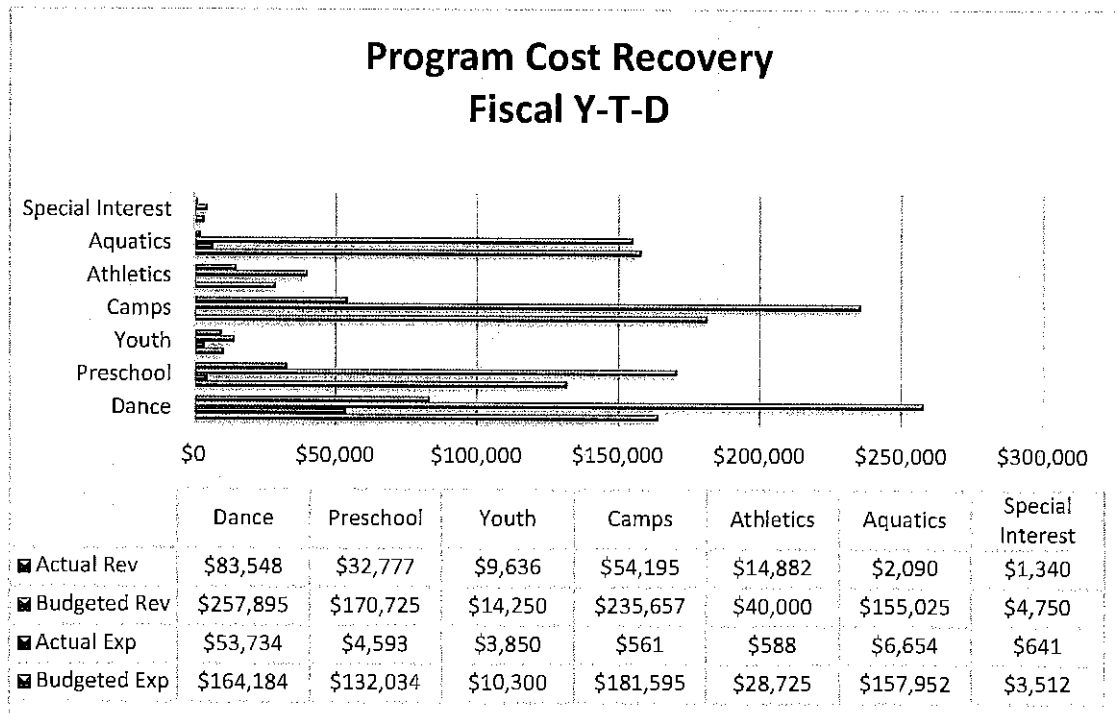


The next internal events that the department is preparing for is the Annual Egg Hunt to be held on Saturday, April 1st at Paulus Park, the Tween Egg Dash & Dessert event (4/7) and Arbor Day (4/29) at Paulus Park. The Egg Hunt is a free event for our community for children ages 2-10 to hunt for eggs at Paulus Park and visit with the Bunny. The Tween Egg Dash and Dessert is an evening egg hunt for tweens ages 9-12 at Paulus Park followed by a DJ dance party and an array of desserts (registration required; nominal fee). Arbor Day will be held at Paulus Park this year featuring a tree planting, sapling giveaway, park scavenger hunt for prizes, Coffee & Cocoa with elected officials followed by community park clean ups. 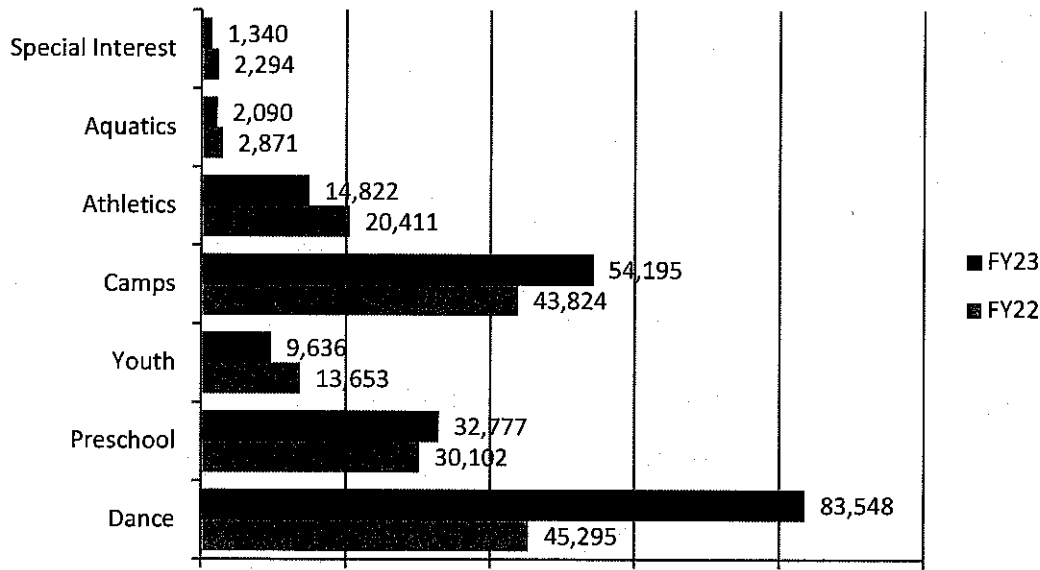
The department is continuing to work with the Public Works team to complete a variety of projects including the Chalet deck replacement, Paulus Park Bandshell/Electronic Marquee Concept, RFP for the Playground Replacement at Jonquil Park (to be reviewed by the Village Board at the March 20th meeting), and punch list items associated with the OSLAD Paulus Park grant (IDNR walk thru with anticipated to be wrapped up by April 1st). The department will also be coordinating the roof replacement with the Public Works Department making necessary modifications to program schedules.

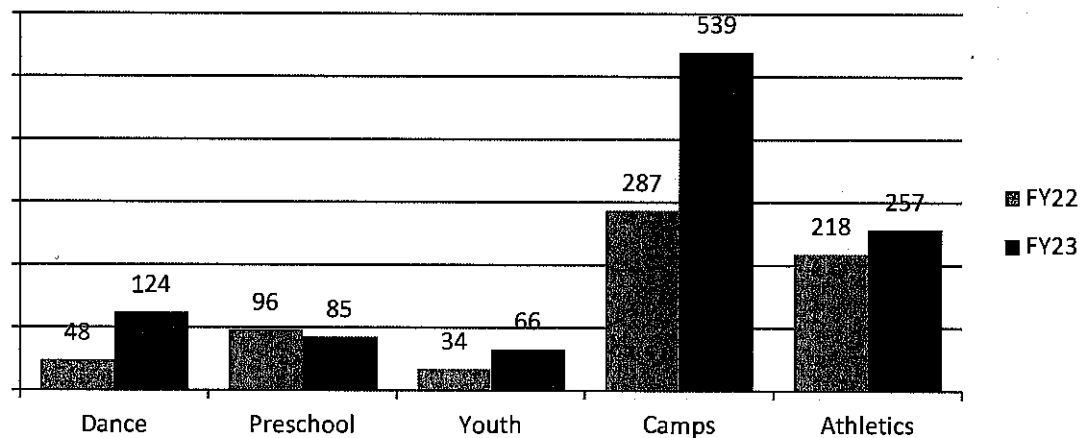


Activity Revenue-Year over Year

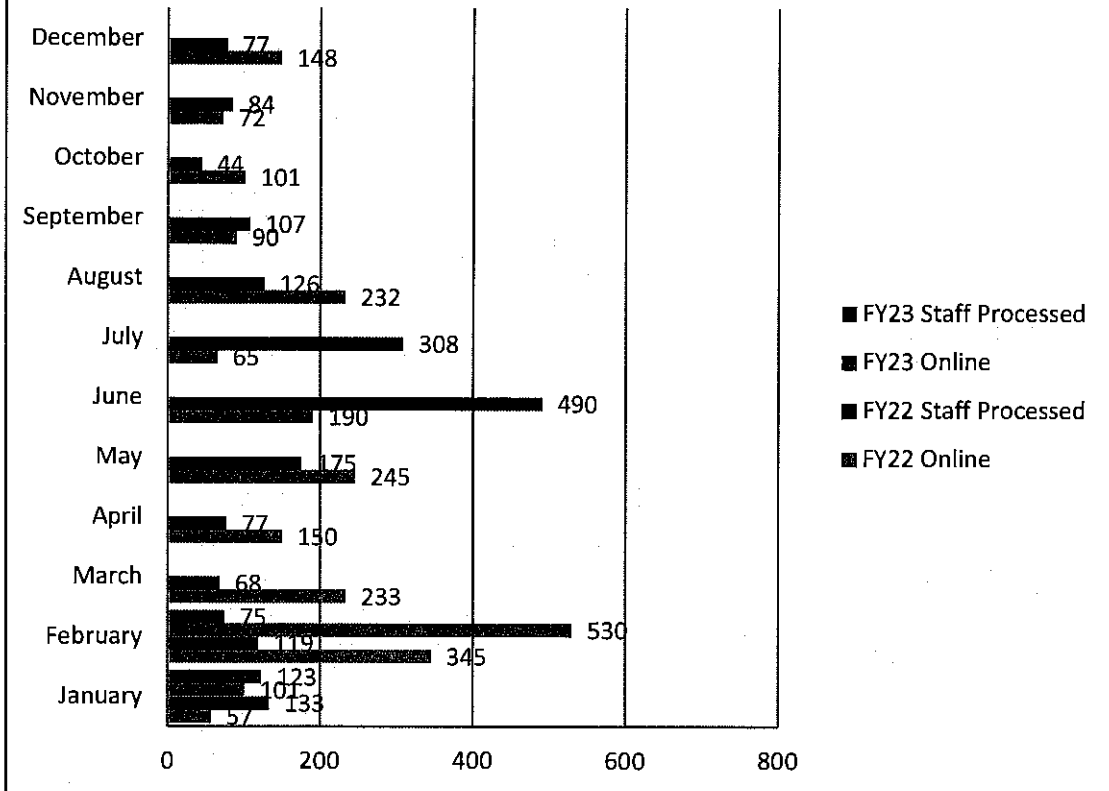

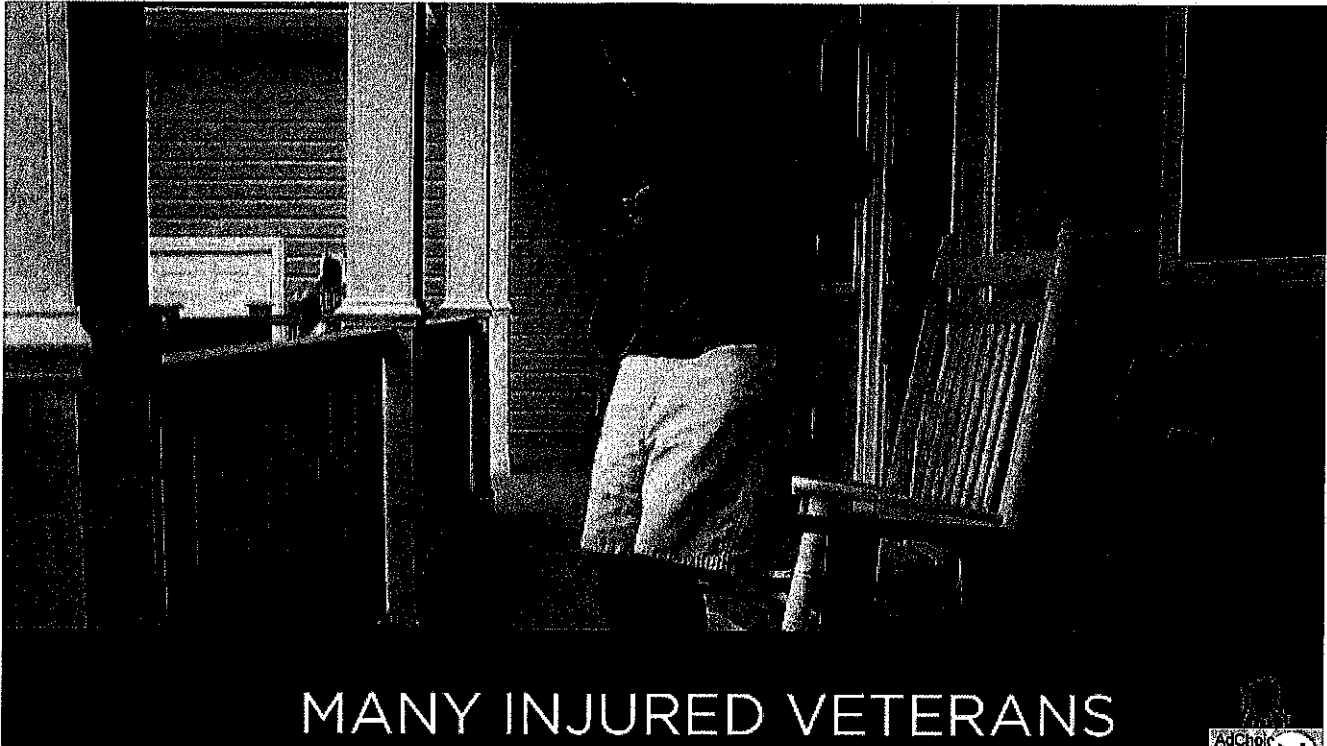

Village officials have not made a decision but methodically have been pursuing information to determine the feasibility and estimated costs of extending Lake Michigan water, which has been described as a "sustainable healthy and economical water source."

"This step will help the board and the residents understand the costs and funding mechanisms associated with the proposal," said Mayor Tom Poynton.

The board will hear and discuss the CDM presentation during its meeting at 7 p.m. at village hall, 70 E. Main St.

In September, the village approved an agreement with CLC JAWA to share engineering fees to determine the feasibility, method and cost of delivering Lake Michigan water to Lake Zurich.

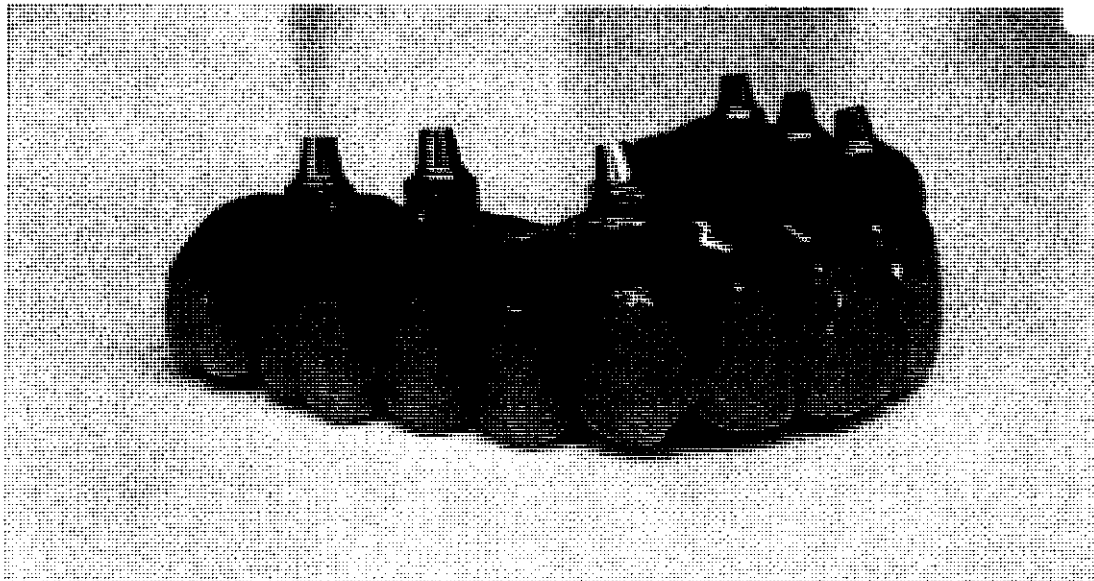
Based in Lake Bluff, CLC JAWA became operational in 1992 and now delivers Lake Michigan water to nearly two dozen communities and unincorporated areas.

CDM Smith, a Boston-based engineering and construction firm, was hired in November at a not-to-exceed cost of about \$130,000 to assess the village's water distribution system, determine what facilities would be needed and provide cost estimates.

Recommendations will include facilities needed to maintain the water system pressure, fire flows and other criteria. Monday's overview of the project will discuss what infrastructure improvements would be needed, how the project would be phased and estimated costs.
