AGENDA

1. Call to Order at 6:30 by Kevin Koch.
2. Roll Call: Present were Chairperson Kevin Koch and members Shawn Bergfalk, Allen Borg, Jeff Carey, and Cathy Malloy. Vice-Chair Tim Andrews and member Sariah Quimby were excused.
3. Approval of Minutes: Chairperson Koch called for a motion to approve the meeting minutes of April 8th, 2025. Motion made by Allen Borg, seconded by Cathy Malloy. Roll call approved. MOTION CARRIED.
4. Public Comments: None
5. New Business
 - A. The Village continues to work with local Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and Eagle Scouts on projects that benefit the community. This year, the Village accepted a Public Property Enhancement Permit Project submitted by a local Eagle Scout. Mary Kozub of Ancient Oaks introduced Katie Bachman, who presented her project: the Kuechman Native Soft Landings Garden. Prior to the project, the garden area was untouched and overgrown, containing steep slopes, weeds, and rocks. Katie's work included installing two tons of rock to support the garden bed, planting 168 native plants, and spreading three yards of wood chips. The project totaled 81 volunteer hours across seven workdays between March and May. Katie and Mrs. Bachman received Thank You gifts, and Chairperson Koch commended Katie on the excellent work.
6. Old Business
 - A. Construction Update: Paulus Park OSLAD Grant Projects
Summary: Director Caputo reported that construction began on July 28 following a one-and-a-half-month delay. Work has started on the amphitheater, though a potential sewer line conflict is under review by Public Works Director Mike Brown. After that determination, the project will proceed with the Splash Pad, ADA beach pathway, and the new Gatehouse. Director Caputo confirmed that all elements are scheduled to be open by Summer 2026 and that the agreement requires all work to be completed by March 31, 2026..
 - B. Park Community Engagement Events: Master Plan for Keys Parks
Summary: Director Caputo reported that open house events will be held at each park to allow residents to provide input on potential improvements. Invitations have been distributed via social media and directly to community stakeholders, partners, and affiliates. Upland will facilitate the events, and Director Caputo will be in attendance. In response to questions, Director Caputo clarified that the meetings are held at the specific parks being discussed and that Upland's

suggested concepts will be presented before being refined through community feedback. She also noted that the department hopes to incorporate inclusive green spaces, natural amenities, and areas that support mental health.

7. Treasurer's Report: Summary: Director Caputo explained that the Finance Department has undergone significant staff changes, including the hiring of a new Finance Director, Rita Kruse, and the retirement of a senior accountant. As a result, financial reporting is currently finalized only through June 2025. She stated that the department remains healthy year over year and is projected to continue growing. The only area experiencing a decline is Aquatics, which is attributed to the absence of Wibits this season and the Splash Pad being out of operation. Chairperson Koch commented that he was surprised attendance was low given the warm weather and asked whether Wibits were available in 2024. Director Caputo confirmed they were, but noted that this year the lake levels were too low to install them. The LPOA reported lake levels down at least six inches, and Chairperson Koch agreed that rainfall has been scarce.

8. Advisory Board Member Reports/Updates

- A. Chairperson Koch reported that the Farmers Market has experienced strong attendance. After being relocated multiple times due to Whitney Road construction and subsequent park construction, the market has now settled in its current location in the grassy parking lot area. Cathy Malloy inquired about the final market date, and Chairperson Koch confirmed it is September 12. He also noted that the market's final special event, a Touch-a-Truck event, will take place on September 5.
- B. Jeff Carey updated the Board that volunteer staffing for Rock the Block is in good shape. Community members Mary Jalove, Garry, and Vice-Chair Tim Andrews will lead Beer Trailer shifts. Carey expressed satisfaction with the alcohol product selection but disappointment that drink prices remain at \$8, unchanged from last year. Chairperson Koch commented that the barricades in front of ticket sales seemed excessive. Director Caputo shared that there will be fewer ticket tents this year and that a new layout placing Tickets and Beer together is being proposed.

9. Director's Report

- A. Park Highlights/Updates- Director Caputo shared numerous FY25 updates, including progress on OSLAD-funded improvements at Paulus Park, which include the sprayground, bandshell, overlook, shoreline restoration, and baggos. Additional updates include resurfacing of the basketball court at Bristol Trails, improvements to the Breezewald Beach retaining wall, progress on the Parks Master Plan, installation of Adirondack Chair photo opportunities at Paulus Park, creation of a Wibit hut at Paulus Park Beach, and installation of new non-motorized storage racks, nearly all of which have been reserved. Chairperson Koch asked about the inspiration for the Adirondack Chair idea, and Director Caputo shared that it came from observing the popularity of photo opportunities at Jack-O-Lantern World. She added that South Beach is closed for the season due to construction and that visitors will use the North Beach entrance. She also noted the replacement of damaged storage units and commended Supervisor Kadzielawski for her efforts.
- B. Facility Highlights/Updates – Director Caputo updated the board on the exterior signage at the Barn, landscaping at Buffalo Creek, security door screen film at Buffalo Creek and Paulus Park Barn, and lock replacement at Chalet and Paulus Park Barn due to door issues resulting in the doors not being locked properly.
- C. Program Update- Director Caputo updated on the board that in June our Camp Program underwent ACA Accreditation. ACA visits onsite, and looks at over 300 standards. She indicated that we have some new Independent Contractor Partnership- Chess Wizards & Magic to come.
- D. FY26 Budget- Director Caputo updated the board about FY 26 Budget additions. The APA Coordinator position has been requested to increase from 19 hours to 30. There is also an ask for

another OSLAD Grant Application, Playground Renovation, Funbrella (Paulus Park), Bocce Ball Court (Paulus); Also added in CIP- Windows at BCA&B as they are the original windows for the building. There has also been an ask for increase in budget for the Live at the Lake concert series as the new bandshell will be built.

- E. Staff Update- Supervisor Stanonik updated information on Day Camp. In 9 weeks, there were 538 registrations across all sessions from ages 3 yrs to 7th grade serving 190 unique families. For 2026 Registration, it will be changed to a Sunday early evening to alleviate stress/frustration of parents signing in at midnight. Yellow Brick Road Preschool is currently at 90% capacity and offering a longer program at Buffalo Creek and the Barn. Preschool will be bringing in three new staff members.
- F. Event Updates- The Park and Recreation Board collectively expressed concerns regarding the cancellation of the Fourth of July fireworks and requested clarification on the timeline of events leading to the decision. Director Caputo provided a detailed summary.

Director Caputo reported that persistent rain occurred throughout the morning of July 4th. At approximately 11:00 a.m., with rain still forecasted for several additional hours, the Village's long-time fireworks vendor requested a meeting with her. She noted that the vendor has been used for over ten years, is highly trusted, and that she has full confidence in their operations.

Director Caputo explained that Lake Zurich's fireworks show is unique because it is launched from the lake. Pontoons are placed on the shoreline two weeks in advance, and in the days leading up to the holiday, the fireworks company installs the cannons and shells. Fireworks themselves are only loaded on the day of the show. Because additional precautions are required for loading fireworks over water and due to the movement of the lake, the loading process takes significantly longer than for a traditional land-based show. Normally, loading begins at 6:00 a.m., and the crew works continuously until about 6:00–7:00 p.m., when the barge is launched to the center of the lake.

At the 11:00 a.m. meeting, Dave from the fireworks company indicated that five hours of load-in time had already been lost because fireworks cannot be loaded in the rain. At that point, even if the rain ended immediately, more than 30% of the intended show would not make it onto the barges. This would result in an abbreviated show of approximately 8–10 minutes, rather than the typical 30–45 minutes.

Director Caputo was presented with two options:

1. Continue loading and shoot only the portion of the show that could be completed, or
2. Cancel the show and store the unused fireworks for the 2026 display, making the 250th anniversary celebration more substantial.

Director Caputo contacted Village Management for input, and the decision was made to cancel the fireworks. She then chose to proceed with the remainder of the day's scheduled activities. Throughout the day, the park welcomed over 6,000 visitors.

Chairperson Koch stated that the communication issued by Village Management regarding the cancellation appeared vague and resulted in resident disappointment, as well as speculation and rumors regarding the decision. The Board agreed that they would have preferred clearer and more transparent communication.

Chairperson Koch asked what steps were being considered to prevent similar issues in the future. Director Caputo responded that due to the nature of the lake-based show, weather and timing will always pose challenges. While switching to a land-based show could offer more controlled circumstances, Paulus Park does not have the capacity to accommodate such a setup; the only feasible location would be the grounds of Lake Zurich High School.

Director Caputo assured the Board that the fireworks were not damaged, did not get wet, and are currently stored for use in 2026.

The discussion concluded with acknowledgment that although the Board and Director Caputo held differing opinions regarding the decision made on July 4th, the Park and Recreation team and Director Caputo consistently prioritize safety, and the Village stands by the determination that the correct decision was made.

Subject: **Heatherleigh Park Playground Renovation**

Issue: The FY26 budget includes \$120,000 in the Capital Fund for a park playground renovation. Work for the renovation includes the removal of the current structure including footing and surfacing, design, procurement and installation of new playground equipment, fall zone material, and recycled plastic perimeter containment edging.

Analysis: Per the project proposal and the Playground Replacement Plan, this year's budgeted playground replacement is to be allocated to the 25-year old playground at Heatherleigh Park (located at 435 Cedar Street). Built and installed in 2001, it is currently the second oldest playground equipment in our inventory (Oak Ridge Playground is 26 years old; deferring renovation due to the park's inclusion in the Key Parks Master Plan). The average life span of playgrounds with normal routine maintenance is approximately 20 years.

Heatherleigh Park, a 1.6-acre neighborhood park, contains many shade trees as well as a large pond at the west end of the property with a small wetland attached making it a peaceful setting for outdoor activities. The park features green spaces, a playground, tennis court, 8 spaces parking lot and walking paths. The park serves 100+ direct households within a .25 mile radius (approximately 2% of our households in Lake Zurich) and currently offers play equipment that accommodates ages 5-12.

The Parks and Recreation Department intends to release a request for proposals as of the new year. Qualifying designs will be presented to the neighborhood and community to vote for their favored design for purchase and install.

Subject: Construction Update: Paulus Park OSLAD Grant Projects

Issue: The Village of Lake Zurich was awarded a \$600,000 OSLAD grant (50% matching grant) and entered into an agreement with the State of Illinois in March of 2024 with the approved grant projects to be fully completed within a 24-month period (no later than March 31, 2026 per the agreement). An award of the contract for the OSLAD Paulus Park Grant Project Construction was approved by the Village Board on April 7, 2025 to Stuckey Construction Company, Inc. of Waukegan, Illinois. Stuckey Construction commenced construction activities starting the week of July 28th.

Background: Our Public Works team is continuing to work with Hitchcock Design Group and Stuckey Construction on the OSLAD grant projects. During the month of October, shoreline work on the Northern end of the property was complete as well as the construction of the bandshell, ADA accessible ramp at the beach and ADA-accessible baggo area (limited punch list items remaining such as landscaping, installation of the baggo boards, installation of handrails for the ramp, installation of the back of house storage shed at the bandshell and restoration of concrete walkways at the bandshell). Stuckey anticipates outstanding items in the bandshell and baggo area to be completed by mid-December, weather pending, with focus to be directed to the out-cropping area on the Northern end of the property, Splash Pad and filtration room construction.

Stuckey Construction is also actively working with a sub to complete utility (sanitary and water) relocation by the bandshell area per the Village. This work was determined necessary as the utilities were found to be located too close in proximity to the bandshell footings; relocating the lines are to prevent for future issues and accommodate any future improvements at the site. Since this is an unexpected expense, the costs will be paid for through the project contingency.

Subject: Master Plan for Keys Parks: Survey & Open House Community Engagement

Issue:

The 2025 budget allocates \$100,000 to hire a consulting firm to create a master plan aimed at optimizing the Village's five key park properties- Staples Park, Oak Ridge Park, Old Mill Grove Park, Zurites Park and Kuechmann Arboretum. The plan will also guide future investment and redevelopment efforts over the next 5 to 10 years. At the June 16, 2025 Village Board meeting, Upland Design Ltd. was awarded the contract and will serve as the Village's partner in developing this master plan.

Analysis:

Upland Design has completed the initial phase of the master plan, which included data collection and site analysis, and is now finalizing the community engagement and concept development stages.

In addition to park open houses and preliminary community surveys, Upland Design partnered with ETC Institute in October to distribute a statistically valid survey to a selected group of Lake Zurich residents. With the target response count now met, the survey has been opened to the broader community and is available at LakeZurichParkSurvey.org, as announced through Benchmarks and social media.

Upland Design will host a final open house at the Paulus Park Barn on Thursday, December 11, from 5–7 p.m. to present initial concepts and give residents and park users one last opportunity to share feedback on potential improvements.

For those unable to attend the open house in person, an online survey will be available at LakeZurich.org to gather additional feedback on the concepts.

Departmental Narrative

The department is finalizing all Spring/Summer 2026 brochure offerings in the upcoming months, which is scheduled for release to residents in late January or early February. Due to recent issues with lake levels, the Wibit Inflatables information has been temporarily removed from the beach section; however, the Wibits will return as conditions and staffing levels allow heading into the summer season. In anticipation of the Splash Pad reopening, the department is planning a ribbon-cutting event to celebrate this exciting new community amenity and officially kick off the summer season—additional details will be shared as spring approaches.

Based on feedback from both staff and residents, online registration for day camp will now open on Sunday, February 8 at 5pm, rather than at midnight on a Monday. Staff will be available at the center from 5-7pm that evening to assist with emails and phone calls.

The season's brochure will also feature the return of Dog Obedience classes under a new independent contractor, Freedom Found K9, as well as forest bathing (nature connection) programs led by Cathy McCauley in partnership with Ancient Oaks, taking place at the Kuechmann Arboretum and Oak Ridge Marsh beginning this Spring.

Upland Design has worked with ETC Institute to launch the survey community engagement phase of the Village's Key Parks Master Plan, which includes Old Mill Grove Park, Oak Ridge Park, Kuechmann Arboretum, Staples Park, and Zurites Park. Once the target number of responses are collected, the survey will be made available to the entire Lake Zurich community via the Master Plan webpage, with notifications shared through social media and Benchmarks. After the survey closes and community feedback is integrated into the draft plan, the engagement phase will conclude with a final open house to present the draft park concepts to the public. The final plan and presentation to the Village Board is still on schedule to take place in January or February of the new year.

The department is continuing to work with the Public Works team to complete a variety of projects: Breezewald Park beach retaining wall, lighting for the holiday season at Breezewald Park/Main Street, Buffalo Creek storage and the continued construction management for the Paulus Park OSLAD projects.

Our Public Works team is continuing to work with Hitchcock Design Group and Stuckey Construction on the OSLAD grant projects. During the month shoreline work on the Northern end of the property was complete as well as the construction of the bandshell, ADA accessible ramp at the beach and ADA-accessible baggo area (limited punch list items remaining such as landscaping, installation of the baggo boards, installation of handrails for the ramp, installation of the back of house storage shed at the bandshell and restoration of concrete walkways at the bandshell). Stuckey anticipates outstanding items in the bandshell and baggo area to be completed by mid-November with focus to be directed to the out-cropping area on the Northern end of the property, Splash Pad and filtration room construction. Stuckey Construction will also be working with a sub to complete utility relocation by the bandshell area per the Village once the Jack O Lantern World event series concludes. This work was determined necessary as the utilities were found to be located too close in proximity to the bandshell footings; relocating the

lines are to prevent for future issues and accommodate any future improvements at the site. Since this is an unexpected expense, the costs will be paid for through the project contingency.



The department held the first annual Howl-O-Ween on Sunday, October 12th, from 10 AM to 1 PM at Staples Park. A great time was had by all of our furry friends and their two-legged companions. The department estimates event attendance to be approximately 300 attendees. Event highlights included the dog parade and costume contest (winners pictured here), pet expo featuring artisans, services and adoption agencies, food vendors, live DJ, a paw reader and photo station. Special thanks to NHS, our amazing

volunteers and staff, and our Presenting Sponsors: All Creatures Animal Hospital, Companion Animal Hospital, and Happy Paws Animal Hospital who were all present at the event.

Planning is continuing for this year's Miracle on Main Street, taking place on Saturday, December 6, from 3-6 p.m. in downtown Lake Zurich.

The department recently lost a beloved and long-standing volunteer, **Tim Andrews**, who dedicated more than 13 years to the Park and Recreation Advisory Board and was an integral member of the Miracle on Main Street committee. Tim's holiday spirit was truly infectious—he had been involved with the event since its move from Paulus Park to Main Street.

A fun fact many may not know: **Tim was the one who came up with the event's name, "Miracle on Main Street,"** during the department's rebranding of the celebration.



To honor Tim's lasting impact and joyful spirit, the committee and department will purchase a star tree topper in his memory using event funds. This special addition will ensure that Tim's presence shines brightly at Miracle on Main Street—not only this year, but for many years to come.

Preparations for Miracle on Main and all the holiday happenings set to kick off next month including the debut of the **holiday tree that has grown to a full 30ft** as well as Main Street and Breezewald Park decorations.







Activity Revenue-Year over Year




