Lake Zurich residents flock to our annual festivals, parades and celebrations such as the Alpine Carnival in July, Independence Day Celebration, Water Lantern Festival and Jack O' Lantern World. In recent years, we have added a highly successful Farmers Market in Paulus Park each Friday in warm-weather months and a wildly popular one-day Rock the Block music fest/street dance in September.

Lake Zurich has emerged as a prime area for economic development with a great mix of businesses and a pro-business climate. In Lake Zurich, you will find a vibrant retail environment, robust industrial park, ready, able and highly educated workforce, easy access to markets, and a pro-active, business friendly municipal government with leadership that understands your needs and will work with you.

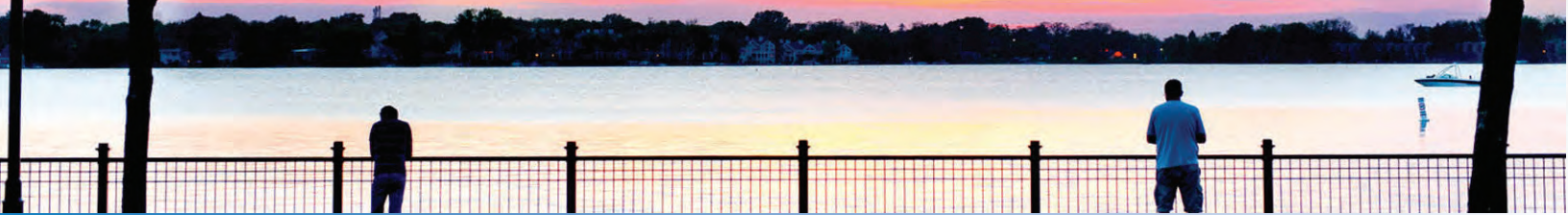

HISTORY

The Village of Lake Zurich is located in southwestern Lake County approximately 37 miles northwest of downtown Chicago. The Village is an established residential community which traditionally served as a market center for surrounding rural areas and, earlier in the 20th century, as a popular summer resort. The population has increased by more than five times since 1960, as the Village has shared in the economic growth that has come from an expanding Chicago metropolitan area. Lake Zurich has developed into a community with above-average wealth and Settlers first came to the area in the 1830's. George Ela settled in the area of Deer Grove, not far from Cedar Lake (now Lake Zurich) in 1935. Seth Paine, a Chicagoan, came to the area in 1836, and built a number of commercial establishments in what is now downtown Lake Zurich. New England farmers and German immigrants followed, and the Village was incorporated on September 29, 1896.

The Village grew slowly after its incorporation. The Palatine and Lake Zurich and Wauconda Railroad was built in 1910, but the line was discontinued in 1920. Rand Road (now U.S. Route 12) was paved through town in 1922, and helped establish Lake Zurich, with its rural setting and 250-acre lake, as a summer resort community. The east-west State Route 22, which also runs through Lake Zurich, was constructed in 1927. Population growth accelerated after World War II, with the Village's population increasing from 850 in 1950 to 3,458 in 1960, and further to 4,082 in 1970, 8,225 in 1980, and 14,927 in 1990 (up 81.5% from 1980). The 2000 Census reported a population of 18,104 up 21.3% from 1990.

The Village's municipal neighbors include North Barrington to the west, Deer Park to the south, Kildeer to the southeast and east, and Hawthorn Woods to the north. Transportation links include U.S. Route 12 and State Route 22, and freight rail service by the CN Railroad. Commuter train service to Chicago is available in Barrington, five miles from Lake Zurich. O'Hare International Airport is approximately 30 miles from the Village. According to the 2020 Census Lake Zurich's population is 20,054.

The Village is a non-home rule community that operates under the management form of municipal government. Lake Zurich is governed by a President and a six-member Board of Trustees. All are elected at an at-large basis in non-partisan elections to overlapping four year terms. The Board and President are charged with (among other things) setting policy, passing ordinances, adopting the budget and hiring the Village Manager. In turn, the Village Manager oversees the day-to-day operations of the Village.

BOARDS & COMMISSIONS

The following is a list of commissions and committees that are filled by residents. If interested in volunteering, call Village Hall.

Board of Fire & Police Commissioners: This is a three-member commission scheduled to meet the third Tuesday of every month at 5:30pm. This commission is responsible for the hiring process, discipline and termination of sworn fire and police personnel.

Community/Police Advisory Committee: This is a seven-member committee scheduled to meet the second Wednesday every three months at 6:30 pm. This committee acts as a liaison between the community and the Police Department, addressing concerns brought forward by residents. These concerns include traffic related issues, village ordinances, or neighborhood problems.

Firefighters Pension Board: This is a five-member Board scheduled to meet once every three months on a Wednesday at 8:00 am. This Board has the duty to control and manage the Pension Fund, investment policy and the review of various types of pension applications of the sworn personnel on the Fire Department.

Park & Recreation Advisory Board: This is a seven-member Board scheduled to meet the second Tuesday of every-other month at 6:30 pm. The purpose of this Board is to serve as a liaison between residents and the Village Board on all matters related to the development and operation of recreation programs, playgrounds, facilities, parks, and to make recommendations to the Village Board.

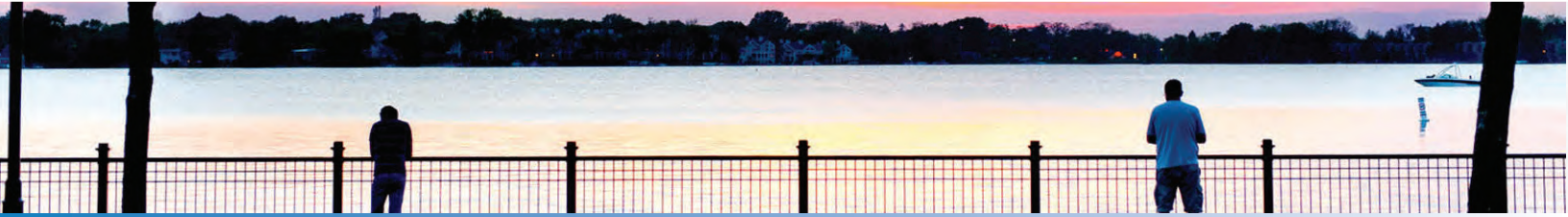
Planning & Zoning Commission: This is a seven-member commission (plus one alternate member) scheduled to meet the third Wednesday of every month at 7:00 pm. The PZC is responsible for long-range planning for the Village and making recommendations to the Village Board on development issues and proposals.

Police Pension Board: This is a five-member Board scheduled to meet the second Tuesday every three months at 8:00 am. This Board has the duty to control and manage the Pension Fund, investment policy and the review of various types of pension applications of the sworn personnel of the Police Department.

Tree Commission: This is a five-member Board scheduled to meet the first or second Tuesday each month at 6:30 pm. This commission is responsible for the maintenance, inventory, and growth of our urban forest.

WATER & SEWER BILLING INFORMATION

- * To setup water/sewer service, please visit LakeZurich.org and fill out a Utility Billing Application (also found at end of Guide)
- * All utility accounts are billed on a monthly cycle.
- * Effective January 1, 2024 the water/sewer rate is \$2.347 per 100 gallons.
- * Each bill is based on a minimum of 2,000 gallons, so it will be at least \$46.94.
- * If you would like to have your bill paid electronically, you can sign up for auto-payment online at LakeZurich.org. You will need to register through InvoiceCloud to setup autopay.
- * If you need help with any of this, please contact Village Hall at 847-438-5141.



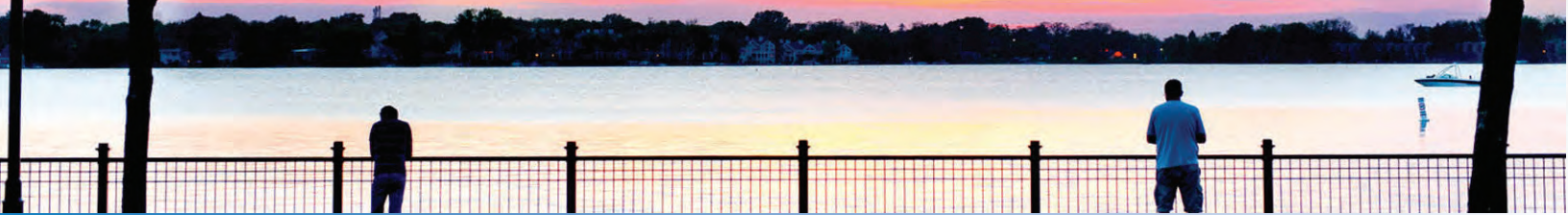
- * The payment will be deducted from your account on the due date noted on the bill.
- * The Village offers a senior resident(65+)/disabled discount to those who qualify. The discount is \$14.24 off your monthly bill. Applications for the discount are available at lakezurich.org. Please provide a copy of your Driver's License or State ID with the application. A copy of the application can also be found at the end of this guide.

The Village of Lake Zurich's present water source is ground water provided by six wells drilled into the ground. Five of the six wells have Ion Exchange Treatment Facilities to remove the impurities present in the water. The sixth well does not have Ion Exchange Treatment Facilities and is on an emergency-only-use status. The effluent - treated well water - is blended with raw well water at a ratio of approximately 73 percent treated water to 27 percent raw well water to produce finished water that meets EPA's requirement for radium and a water hardness similar to Lake Michigan water.

Every year the Village publishes a Consumer Confidence Water Quality Report. This summarizes the quality of the water that is provided and how it compares to the Environmental Protection Agency standards. The Village consistently meets all drinking water health standards.

REFUSE & RECYCLING CURBSIDE PICKUP

- * The Village contracts with Lakeshore Recycling Systems (LRS) for weekly collection on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.
- * Each residence has a once a week refuse and recycling collection on the same day, along with yard waste collection (limit of 15 bags).
- * New residents should call LRS at (847) 381-9300 to schedule service and ask billing questions.
- * Billing is handled quarterly directly by LRS, not the Village.
- * Refuse Options (Effective September 1st, 2024)
 - * Plan A \$26.99/month for 95-gallon cart
 - * Plan B \$25.85/month for a 65-gallon cart
 - * Senior Plan (Large) \$24.29/month for a 95-gallon cart
 - * Senior Plan (Small) \$23.27/month for a 65-gallon cart
- * Monthly costs above include both refuse and recycling costs.
- * A discount of 10% off any cart size is available for senior residents aged 65 and older.
- * Carts should not be placed by the street before 7 pm the night before pickup or after 7 am on the pickup day.
- * Carts should be placed with the handles facing your house. When not at curb, store carts so they are not visible from the street.
- * Electronic waste is accepted free of charge to residents at the LRS facility on Old Rand Rd in Wauconda, with a limit of one TV or monitor per visit and up to 5 other smaller electronic items.
- * Lake Zurich participates in community recycling programs for clothing/textile, shoe, electronics and pharmaceutical recycling. Contact Village Hall at (847) 540-1684 for details.
- * As part of the Village's contract with LRS an annual e-waste collection event will take place each July. Subscribe to Benchmarks, the community e-newsletter, to be alerted of the event.



VILLAGE ORDINANCES

— BEACH AND LAKE USAGE

- * No watercraft may be moored or operated on the lake of Lake Zurich without first obtaining and displaying a Lake Watercraft Maintenance and Use Permit from the Lake Property Owners Association of Lake Zurich and paying a required fee.
- * For parks near the water, swimming is only allowed in the designated beach areas when a lifeguard is on duty. Paulus Park beach admission is by season pass or daily fee. Breezewald Park beach is a free residents-only beach.
- * Lake Zurich residents only have the opportunity to launch non-motorized watercrafts from Paulus Park for an nominal daily fee or season pass. Watercrafts include: Kayaks, Canoes, Paddle Boats, Windsurfers, Row Boats, and Long Boards. Inflatable crafts are not permitted. All crafts need to stay in the No Wake area of Lake Zurich, wear a PFD, carry a whistle for emergencies, and review the rules of the lake.

— BLOCK PARTIES

- * An application for a Block Party must be submitted fourteen days before the intended date to the Village Manager's Office. Applications can be found on the Village's website or call Village Hall at 847-540-1684. Block parties are fun and build community bonds, but these neighborhood events should not extend pass 9 pm.

— CURFEW

- * Applies to anyone under 17 years of age. Saturday and Sunday from 12-6 am and Monday through Friday from 11 pm to 6 am.

— HOUSE MAINTENANCE

- * Display address numbers using a color contrasting from their background, a minimum of 4-inch- high numbers.
- * Keep trim and wall exteriors free from peeling paint and rotting wood. Re-paint/re- stain and replace rotting wood when necessary.
- * Maintain handrail and guard rails.

— OUTSIDE STORAGE AND LANDSCAPING

- * Outdoor storage is not allowed. Outdoor storage may include construction materials and yard tools.
- * Maintain yard free from litter/debris. Clean animal waste regularly.
- * Maintain lawn so it does not exceed 8 inches in height.
- * Maintain shrubbery and trees so as not to encroach over public sidewalk.



PETS IN THE PARKS

- * We welcome man's best friend here in Lake Zurich. Just as a reminder for the safety, convenience, and enjoyment of all, dogs are to be kept on the paved paths and leashed. Owners and possessors caught with dogs off leash or caught not cleaning up after their dogs are subject to a fine of \$250 - \$500. Please note that if a special event is being held at a park, dogs shall be excluded on those dates.

SIGNS RESTRICTIONS

- * Signs are not permitted on the parkway, which is the area between the sidewalk and the street.
- * Garage sale, election, for sale/rent, community event and sporting club signs are allowed on private property with certain size restrictions as noted on the Village website.
- * Garage sale signs – display on the day of the sale/s. Limited to two garage sales per year.
- * Election signs – the Village prohibits the placement/display of election signs in the parkway (area between the sidewalk and the street)
- * For sale/for rent – not more than one sign per frontage (corner lots allowed 2 signs).

SNOW RESTRICTIONS

- * Typically, plowing operations begin after snow accumulation of 1-2 inches. Depending on weather conditions and information from the Village's weather forecasting service and weather radar system, snow/ice removal operations may begin sooner.

RESIDENTIAL PERMITS

- * Please visit the Community Development page on the Village website to see a list of residential construction projects that require a Village issued permit before construction can begin. The various permit application forms, handouts and requirements are available to download.
- * Please contact Community Development with any questions regarding establishing a home-based business (residential occupation) or regarding any other residential permits.
- * Please be aware that:
 - * Swimming pools over 2 feet in height require a building permit and have additional safety requirements.
 - * Sump discharge must be at least 10 feet from all property lines. Changes in site drainage may require a building permit.

VEHICLE REGULATIONS

- * No vehicle may be parked on the front lawn or obstructing public sidewalk. Boats, RVs, trailer and other vehicles have restrictions on where they may be parked dependent on their size. Refer to Village requirements or contact Community Development for details.
- * Vehicles shall be operable and display current license plates.
- * Parking prohibited on all village streets between 2am – 5am.



— WASTE - LARGE OBJECTS & BULK ITEMS

- * A weekly bulk item is included, which LRS will collect free of charge. One bulk item per week. Item must weigh less than 50 pounds and be shorter than 4 feet in length. No construction materials or chemicals are allowed.
- * Appliances cannot be disposed in landfills. LRS will collect your old appliances left curbside and properly dispose of them. Residents will need to call LRS in advance to schedule appliance pick-up. Only \$10 per appliance.
- * LRS offers household back-door collection for residents who would like the added convenience of not transporting the carts to the curb each week. This is an optional service at \$25 extra per month.
- * For special bulk-item pickup, please contact LRS to schedule at 847-381-9300.

— YARD WASTE PICKUP

- * Yard waste is collected weekly beginning April 1 through the second full week of December on the same day that refuse and recycling are collected. Yard waste must be placed in biodegradable bags (brown paper), or cans (maximum 50 pounds) that are clearly marked as landscape waste or with an "X". Stickers are not required unless you have more than 15 bags in one day. Yard waste in plastic bags will not be collected.
- * Leaf vacuuming typically runs mid-October through mid-December. Residents are asked to rake leaves to the curb by Monday morning, for pickup by LRS that week. Leaves must be raked to within five feet of the curb and should not be placed in the gutter or street. This service is included in your quarterly bill from LRS.

ANNUAL LAKE ZURICH EVENTS

— MARCH: PURPLE PLUNGE

Date: Early March **Location:** Breezewald Beach
Time: Morning

The Purple Plunge is a community event where participants can register to wade in or take the full plunge into the freezing cold water of Lake Zurich. Each participant can collect pledges and form a team to take the plunge together. The Purple Plunge is a fun family event where participants can wear costumes, carry signs, and just be silly as spectators cheer on the brave plungers. All money raised benefits the American Cancer Society.

— APRIL: ARBOR DAY

Date: Late April **Location:** Paulus Park
Time: All Day

Lake Zurich's Park and Recreation Department hosts an annual Arbor Day event where volunteers can help clean up the various parks around town. This is a great event for people of all ages to get outside, enjoy the outdoors, and help improve the appearance and environment of their town.



— MARCH/APRIL: EGG HUNT

Date: March/April **Location:** Paulus Park

Time: Morning

Our Annual Egg Hunt caters to families with children ages 2+. Egg Hunt is a free event that encourages you to bring the kids and their baskets to collect the goodies left behind by the Bunny (held rain or shine).

— MAY: WATER LANTERN FESTIVAL

Date: May **Location:** Paulus Park

Time: Evening

The Lake Zurich Water Lantern Festival brings people together to light the lake in a magical night that includes food, music, and beauty as the lanterns reflect upon the water.

— JUNE-SEPTEMBER: FARMER'S MARKET

Date: Fridays **Location:** Paulus Park

Time: 3-7pm

Each Friday, 30+ vendors, live music, concessions, and fun activities for the whole family.

— JULY: INDEPENDENCE DAY CELEBRATION

Date: July 4th **Location:** Paulus Park

Time: All Day

Full day celebration, celebrating the independence of the United States. The day is full of music, food, and is capped off by a spectacular fireworks display from the lake.

— JULY: ALPINE FEST

Date: Various days in July **Location:** Lions Park

Time: Friday-Sunday

A summer festival organized and run by the Lake Zurich Lion's Club. Food, music, rides, a parade, and so much more.

— SEPTEMBER: ALPINE RACES

Date: August **Location:** Paulus Park

Time: Morning

One of the biggest races in the area, Alpine Races is put on by the Alpine Runners, a large Running Club in the Chicagoland Area. The Alpine Races feature a half marathon, a 5K, and a variety of shorter races for young kids and teens.

— SEPTEMBER: ROCK THE BLOCK

Date: Early September **Location:** Main Street Lake Zurich

Time: Evening

Rock the Block is Lake Zurich's annual Main Street block party. There is no better way to celebrate the end of the summer, than with food, drink and entertainment. 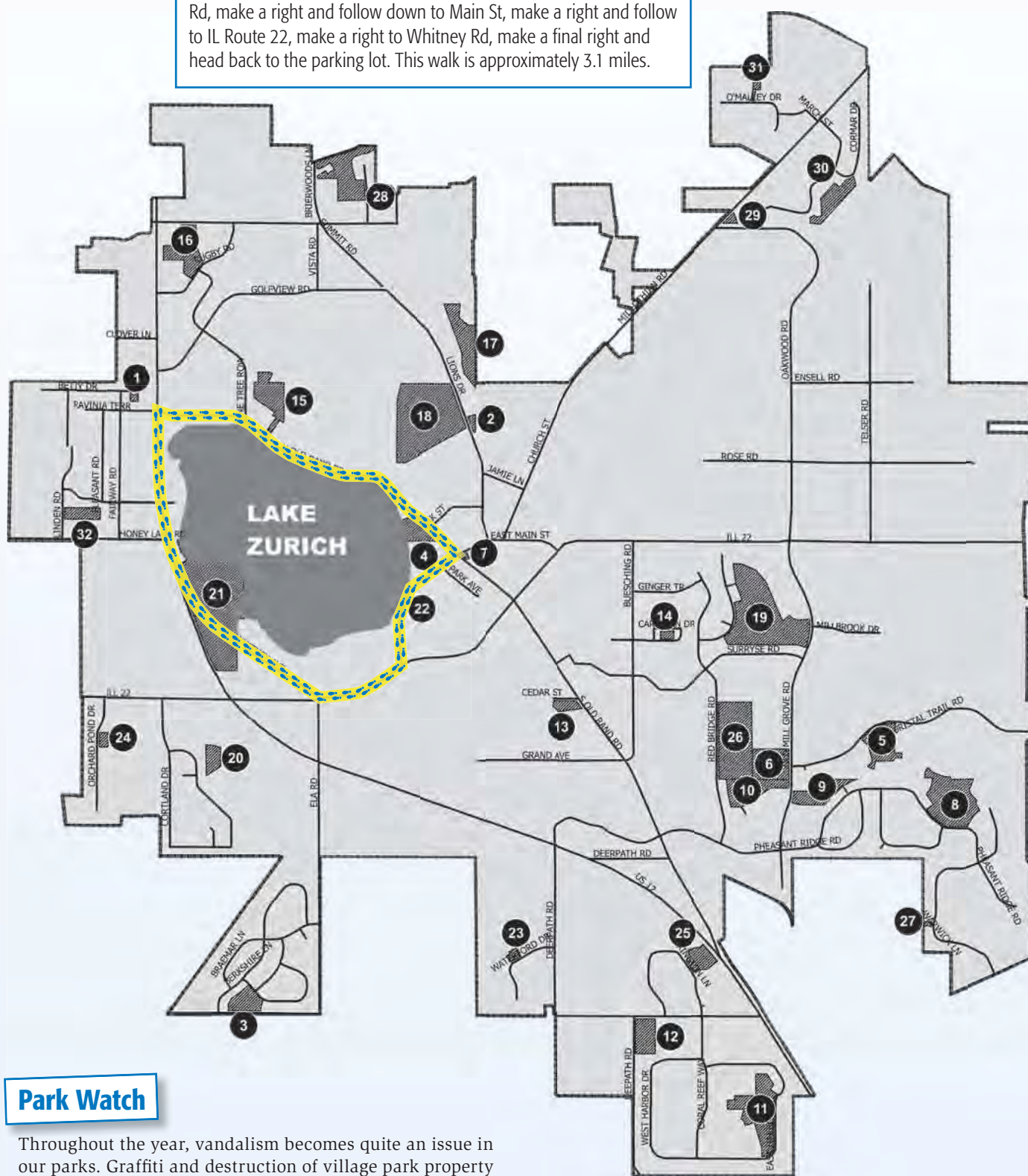
